This feat is even more striking when one considers the fact that State earnings within the period were typically about half of what obtained between 2008 and 2014.

ADMINISTRATION FINANCIAL MANAGEMENT AND GOVERNANCE



Governance is a public trust and no where should this be more evident than in the management of public resources-financial or otherwise



The above statement underscores the dexterity with which this administration wriggled its way through the financial burden prevalent on assumption of office and the declining fiscal resources accruable to the State. The contractual commitments and financial liabilities bequeathed to this administration are being managed effectively without hindering the delivery of dividends of democracy to the citizenry.

It should be noted that as at 29th May, 2015, the volume of liabilities and ongoing capital projects was at the time more than the entire annual budget of the State which was about N100bn. Ironically, the State's financial liquidity position stood at just about N16million.

Some of the financial liabilities inherited include capital expenditure liabilities of N13.64billion, contractual commitments valued at N91.6b,outstanding payments (liabilities) from the 1999-2007 administration amounting to N1.57b, other financial liabilities of N8.05b consisting of unpaid 17% Government pension contribution for several months, borrowed contractual retention, outstanding internal/external scholarship for 2013/2014 academic session, outstanding fees for the 2014/2015 WAEC, NECO, NABTEB and NBAIS examinations for 19,000 students, N2bn MSME loan from the Central Bank of Nigeria as well as outstanding pension liabilities for Local Government and Local Education Authorities.

It is worthy of note that counterpart funding were not paid for SUBEB since 2013. The same can be said for FADAMA III, IFAD, among others.



Inherited financial liabilities and contractual obligations - N114.87BN


Coupled with the problem of financial liabilities, the State was also burdened with a lot of other challenges which could have crippled the operations of Government if they had not been properly managed. These include, declining fiscal resources (from a monthly federal allocation of N5bn in 2014 to an average of N3bn in 2017), high cost of governance, unsustainable salary bills, inefficiencies in resource management and low Internally Generated Revenue (IGR).

To forestall the State from plunging into financial chaos, Government quickly adopted the "prudence and value for money" principle. Governor Badaru being a trained accountant understands that governance is public trust and no where should this be more evident than in the management of public resources - financial or otherwise.

Through these measures, the cost of governance and service delivery was drastically reduced and the quality of public service expanded. For instance, the cost of facility management for various government buildings was reduced by more than 50% with no loss in quality and with almost all existing contractors retained.

In addition, standing orders on government spending has been reduced by 27%. Also, Government House expenditure has been reduced by 68%, expenses of the Deputy Governor's office reduced by 46%, security and related expenses reduced by 91%, protocol expenses reduced by 81% while overhead has been reduced by 54%. (This is a comparison of the last 2 years of the past administration and the first 2 years of the present administration). The Government also rationalized and realigned MDAs for efficiency and cost reduction.

On capital expenditure, a review of the inherited contracts from the previous administration was undertaken and many contractors have given discounts ranging between 10-20 %, which resulted in significant savings.. of about N11bn with road sector discount amounting to N8.23b.

The Civil Service

At the inception of this administration, the civil service was faced with a lot of challenges such as:

- A workforce of over 64,000.
- Wage bill of almost N4,000,000,000.00, representing 75% of State revenue which goes into servicing about 1% of the State population.
- Duplication of functions in almost all MDAs
- Inadequate skilled manpower across the Service.
- High rate of attrition/retirements.
- Poor attitude to work/high rate of absenteeism.

Initiatives of this administration in tackling some of the challenges include:

- Rationalization/Realignment of MDAs
- Installation of electronic biometric thumb printing machine/register.
- Linking staff BVNs to salary.

- Prompt payments of salaries, pensions and gratuities
- Introduction of abridgement courses to meet capacity gap identified in the service.
- Improved and sustained the conduct of regular short-term training.

AGRICULTURE

Our priority on assuming office in 2015 was to develop a local economy driven largely by agriculture which is the principal local activity in the State. onsistent with the economic diversification strategy of the Federal Government, Agriculture was selected as the main driver of the strategic vision of the Badaru administration. With the slogan "Farming is a Business", His Excellency was able to galvanize the people, particularly the youths, into a sector that was beset with a myriad of challenges - age-old model of subsistence agriculture characterized by small-farm holdings, high-level drudgery, inadequate extension services, ineffective response to periodic pest and disease outbreaks and inadequate access to high quality agricultural inputs.

This created an uncompetitive environment with low productivity, leaving the farmers wallowing in a vicious cycle of abject poverty from generation to generation. This is despite the huge comparative advantage enjoyed by the State including its 1.8 million hectares of cultivable land with over 0.4 million hectares of this being fertile FADAMA suitable for all-year round cultivation and huge reservoir of water and able-bodied youths.

Our first point of action was to develop an all encompassing agricultural policy and master plan that will provide a platform for transforming the agricultural landscape to impact on the local economy through improved productivity and value addition in production and post harvest processing. We were able to achieve this all important milestone with the technical assistance of DFID programs (SPARC, ARC, ENABLE2 and GEMS3) operating in the State.

The key objectives of the plan are to:

Develop Agriculture along value chains

Strengthen extension, Research and Development (R & D)in Agriculture

Increase irrigated land, water and alternative energy infrastructure for agriculture.

Increase level of mechanization in agriculture

Promote opportunities in the State for private investments

Mainstream youths, women and other vulnerable groups in agriculture for employment generation and poverty reduction

Adopt a cluster approach to aggregate small holder farmers for better management in input provision to balance the demand for large scale agri-investors with local land holder interests









The Cluster Program was established to refocus the subsistence mindset of the small holder farmer and open his eyes to the commercial potential of his farming activity. A State wide slogan of "Farming is a Business" was adopted and made the catch phrase for all activities of the Agriculture ministry in the State. The cluster farming initiative reflects the steps being taken by Jigawa State to

attain the sustainable development in the agriculture sector through improvements in small scale agricultural development focusing on precision quality, input provision to poor farmers and targeted extension service to attain huge improvements in yield.

The Jigawa State Government took the initiative of registering individual small holder farmers and clustering them for target input provision and extension service.

At inception, a maximum cluster size of 50 Hectares was formed in each of the 287 wards in the state with a maximum of 5 sub clusters where a 50 hectare contiguous lot is not feasible. with input provision in the form of quality seeds, fertilizer and pesticide. So far, a total of 1,306 clusters were established with 64,184 farmers participating. Average farm size was 0.8 Ha per farmer.

overnment was able to achieve unprecedented, across-the-board productivity improvement at par with global averages. In the last 3 years, I 306 farm clusters have been established and fully supported by the Government under the model, ensuring that the principles of business competitiveness and economy of scale are deployed even for small-scale farmers. This has made it possible to achieve significant positive rate of return on agricultural investments through timely access to high quality inputs such as seeds, fertilizer, pesticides and equipment, at much lower cost.

Results so far indicate that there has been a significant improvement in the yield of crops currently being supported under the cluster program. For instance, the average yield of rice has increased from 2.4 ton per hectare to about 5.1 tons for rice with some cluster recording yields as high as 8.0 tons. The same can be said of sesame, groundnut and wheat whose yield have increased to 0.5 tons per hectare for sesame; and 0.9 ton per hectare for groundnuts were achieved.

Extension service is considered germane to the success of any agricultural intervention. In view of this, this administration began the identification, adaptation and dissemination of technologies on crops, livestock, fisheries and agro processing with desired results being witnessed in terms of yield and productivity. The provision of 450 motorcycles and capacity building exercise for Extension workers across the State ensured that investments in agricultural research achieve the desired impacts even in hard to reach areas of the State.

Under the cluster initiative, Inputs are costed, provided on credit and deducted at harvest in cash or kind. Everything is performance driven and clusters are assigned to off takers on an out grower basis with a guaranteed off take price.

Big Ticket names like Dangote Rice, Umza Rice mills and WACOT have all been integrated into the cluster scheme and have taken the model to develop and expand their own cluster out-growers modeled on the government example.

Inputs are sourced direct from manufacturers to guarantee quality and price fairness. The no subsidy culture was adopted for fertilizer and focused on delivery direct to registered farmers and cluster groups even before the presidential initiative on fertilizer took effect.

part from rice and sugar mills at sorting and bagging for export. various stages of completion Government has also encouraged value addition to export crops like sesame and hibiscus by encouraging exporters to engage cluster groups for farm gate purchase which affords a better price for the farmer. These crops are then warehoused in a government provided facility for cleaning,

This arrangement has resulted in WACOT Ltd expanding its out grower arrangement from 200 hectares in 2015 to 8,000 hectares for the 2017 season with 13,000 hectares on standby to be integrated into a total of 20,000 HA of sesame for 2018 and has encouraged

new entrants like Axxon Link Limited to set up a sesame cleaning facility in Andaza Dutse .

TOONS limited is entering into the same arrangement for Hibiscus processing to assure quality assurance following the near ban on Nigerian Hibiscus by Mexico which is our largest market.




The agricultural sector being the economic backbone of Jigawa State has enjoyed tremendous support from the present administration. Budgetary allocation, for example increased from a paltry 2.9 billion in 2015 to N9.0bn inn 2018 (A significant 210% increase).


In consolidating the gains recorded so far in

the agricultural sector, Government is strengthening the existing institutions for efficient service delivery and sustainability of current programme. For instance, the recapitalization of the State Inputs Supply Company, JASCO has brought more liquidity into the company thereby, guaranteeing the availability of input and farm machinery to farmers across the State. Also worthy of mention is the repositioning of Jigawa Research Institute and the establishment of the State technical committee on Agriculture. The Committee, which is headed by His Excellency the Governor meets on a weekly basis to evaluate and improve on the implementation of agricultural interventions State wide.

ne of the focal points of the G o v e r n o r B a d a r u l e d administration in Jigawa State is to tactically reduce poverty, create wealth and promote the wellbeing and prosperity of the populace. In achieving this, a strategic approach aimed at job creation in the areas of private sector investment generation, improvement of agriculture practices among the peasant farmers, development of human capital and increment in economic activities in the rural areas is being adopted and pursued vigorously by the Government.

The alarming rate of unemployment and extreme poverty (see factsheet above) in

the State which has been further worsened by the dwindling economic fortunes of the country needs to receive attention in the short and medium term to forestall a collapse of the social and economic order of the State, which could pose serious security challenges for the Nation in the near future. This reality led to the massive roll out of empowerment programmes targeted at the women, the youth and the vulnerable.

To ensure that the interventions are tailored to the needs of the people, the Government constituted a committee on empowerment with a clear mandate to embark on community consultations on their needs and priority trades and come up with various economic empowerment programs that are demand driven and efficient.

From 2015 till date, **134,344** people have benefited from the various empowerment programs by the State. These programs cut across agriculture, artisanship, commerce, transportation e.t.c Some of the programs are highlighted in the subsequent pages

Goat Breeding Micro-Credit Scheme

ivestock production in the form of a women specific goat breeding program was undertaken in early 2016 on the basis of a huge export opportunity for goat meat into the Middle east through an entity in Kuwait. The minimum demand could not be met and a long term initiative was started with 20 women per ward selected across 287 wards and given 3 live goats on loan to be retrieved after 18 months. This is essentially a microcredit scheme with the goat representing the currency.

A total of 17,220 goats were distributed and collection commenced on schedule with a retention rate of 91% and repayment of 82%.Earlier in the year, re-distribution commenced in 12 Local GovernmentAreas.

This scheme is set to receive a huge boost under the CBN-AADS where we are targeting 40 women per ward or 11,480 beneficiaries receiving 34,440 goats.

It is expected that the livestock pattern of the State will be transformed if the reproduction momentum is maintained providing the backdrop for a robust livestock export initiative. The exporters are impressed with the progress so far and are in the process of setting up a Halal slaughter facility and cold room.

Other market driven empowerment initiatives

This administration also embarked on the empowerment of youth and women in various aspect of trade through the disbursement of working capital, equipment and other business input. These incllude tailoring, welding, potent medicine sales, poultry, aquaculture, apiculture, scrap dealing, groundnut oil millling, tomato preservation, e.t.c.

EDUCATION











At inception in 2015, the education sector was in a state of near collapse. The sector faced challenges ranging from infrastructural deficit, low enrolment figures, poor quality teachers, poor learning outcomes, high number of out of school children and paucity of instructional materials compounded by absence of policy support and resources.

This administration immediately embarked on a State -Wide consultation with stakeholders in the sector. The painstaking exercise led to the formulation of the **Education Change Agenda**.












From May 2015 to date, Government has spent the sum of (N9.766bn) in the construction /renovation of 4,520 classrooms, 411 toilets cubicles. 6 Admin Blocks, supply of 97,659 sets of pupils/students furniture and 3,416 sets for teachers, 79 hand pumps, 188 staff houses and 4 hostels buildings (completed and on-going)



LEARNING CONDITION IN SECONDARY SCHOOLS

INTRODUCTION: Congestion in schools, classes, dormitories became major challenge in providing atmosphere conducive for learning. Classroom congestion, ranged from 70-120 students per class in Primary/Junior schools and 65-120 in Senior schools while the hostel range from 140-210 per hostel/dormitory. In some cases a hostel of 200 capacity occupied by 300-400 students.



TEACHER RECRUITMENT/ DEPLOYMENT STRATEGY

Ministry of Education Science and Technology MoEST was cleared to recruit 500 teachers as phase I of the series of teacher recruitment approved by the State Government.

312 teachers already collected their appointment letters with the Ministry and have been posted to various schools.

More recruitment is already in progress where the 118 teachers are to be recruited in the phase II of the exercise.

This is the most unbiased, professionally and logically conducted recruitment in the history of the State. Transparent recruitment process developed and entrenched. It is also regarded as the largest number recruited since 2013.

State Universal Basic Education Board SUBEB is cleared to recruit 1393, out of which 773 are waiting for interview

Plans are concluded for another round of aptitude test to recruit 620 teachers among the thousands of applicants.

The Board established a sound, unbiased and professional recruitment process based on merit.

In SUBEB the new teachers are to be posted to their respective Local Governments.

Teachers' houses are built in the disadvantaged areas (hard to reach) for smooth discharge of duties. In MoEST, new teachers are posted to newly establish 26 schools. Henceforth the Ministry and SUBEB make it a mandatory to cater for schools with insufficient teachers as a priority during postings

AGENCY FOR MASS EDUCATION

The Agency for Mass Literacy in Jigawa is targeting young adults (males and females), non-literates older people, second chance students, school dropouts and physically challenged for general literacy and numeracy for both basic and post basic as well as skills acquisition.



ENVIRONMENT

Understanding that no meaningful human capital development can be achieved without a clean and secure environment, the Governor Badaru led administration made it a priority to tackle some of the environmental challenges confronting the people of Jigawa State.

At inception of this administration, it was discovered that the State was faced with some of the most devastating environmental challenges such as desertification, typha and aquatic weeds invasion, massive flood and erosion as well as poor waste management.

Combatting Desertification

In order to reduce the adverse effect of desert encroachment and its attendant consequences, the following measures were taken by the present administration:



Control of Typha and other aquatic weeds invasion

To control aquatic weeds invasion and enhance free flow of water along the course of river Hadejia, the Ministry in collaboration with Hadejia-Jama'are River Basin Development Authority, deployed equipment for typha grass clearance downstream of Burum-gana in Guri Local Government Area, a distance of 15kms was cleared.



The Ministry also facilitated manual river channels clearance, by identifying and supporting 15 self-help organizations along river Hadejia, covering 13 Local Government Areas namely; Ringim, Taura, Jahun, Miga, Kaugama, K/Hausa, Auyo, Hadejia, Malam Madori, Kirikasamma, Guri, Birniwa and Gwaram. The concerted efforts resulted in the clearance of over 100km of rivers, primary and secondary tributaries and ponds.

The mitigation measures taken by the present administration have resulted in increased river flow downstream; reduced flooding; increased water availability for irrigation and above all reduction in conflict over natural resources utilization as more land is now freed for farming, fishing and grazing.

At a recent ceremony held to distribute canoes and cutting implements in May 2017, Local Government Chairmen and community leaders from Yobe and Bauchi States attended in solidarity and testified to the effectiveness of the exercise in Jigawa to the extent that communities that had not cultivated their farms in 20 years had suddenly got back to the farm because of the availability of water.

Government has adopted a preventive measure to curb the issue of perennial flooding by embarking on the construction of drainages and culverts in several locations across the State Some of the areas are:

HEALTH

Our aspiration for the health sector is to increase access to quality, affordable healthcare for all ciitizens. To achieve this, we have started addressing the infrastructural decay evident in the sector on assumption of office through the massive construction and rehabilitation of new and existing basic, primary, secondary and tertiary healthcare facilities across the State. Our 'One Primary Healthcare Center (PHC)' per ward policy is beginning to yield the desired results as manifested in the delivery of 58 PHCs

We are strengthening our manpower to address the shortage of healthcare workers and improving the capacity of existing ones.

We will not relent in our efforts until the State's poor health indices are reversed across board in conformity with goal number 4 of the Sustainable Development Goals.

PRIMARY HEALTH CARE

- The policy of having one functional PHC per ward continued in to 2017/18 as additional 31 PHC clinics were constructed at a cost of about N583 Million
- Same facilities are equipped at a cost of N98,965,965.00
- Previously 27 such facilities were constructed across the state and 27 midwife quarters spread across the 27 LGAs
- National Policy on Food and Nutrition was domesticated and
- In the process of domesticating National Task Shifting/Task Sharing Policy



Provision of solar power in Hospitals

To ensure that critical segments of hospitals have access to constant electricity supply, Government have embarked on the provision of solar power to health facilities across the State. This will eliminate the incidence of darkness in patient wards and other essential areas at night and enhance efficient service delivery to the public at all times. In the long run it will reduce the running cost of diesel procurement and generator maintenance across board

So far, three hospitals have been benefited from the scheme. These include Dutse, Babura, and Gumel general hospitals.



Government has also acquired accreditation for School of Midwifery, Birnin Kudu. The school of nursing, Hadejia has been completed and has resumed classes. Another school of midwifery is being established in Babura this year while also working on upgrade of the Birnin kudu school.

The new schools are needed because the existing schools cannot produce beyond the capacity ceiling of only 100 nurses and 100 midwives annually as stipulated by the Nursing Council of Nigeria.





Infant Mortality Changes MICS 2011 Versus 2017 Per 1000 Live Births






Antenatal Care MICS 2011 versus 2017





To enhance economic growth and improve the quality of lives of its citizens, critical infrastructure needs to be put in place. This will ensure that economic activities are carried out unhindered across the length and breadth of the State.

The Present administration understands the importance of providing qualitative infrastructure and is taking bold steps improve on existing and provide new ones.

ROAD PROJECTS

In line with the administration's commitment to provide quality road network, it is embarking on the massive construction and rehabilitation of roads, bridges and culverts connecting critical units and easing the movement of goods and humans across the State. As at 3rd May, 2018, there are **71 roads**, measuring **1,262.67KM** under construction.

716.5km of these are inherited from the previous administration at various levels of completion while another **396.85KM** were awarded by this administration between 2016 and 2017. So far, in 2018, another **149.32 K**m of road contracts were awarded with 20% of contract value (mobilization fees) paid.

INHERITED REGIONAL ROADS

On assumption of office in 2015, this administration inherited forty-two (42) road projects (measuring 716.5km and valued at N98.83bn) at various stages of completion.







The Jigawa State Water Sector comprises of the Ministry of Water Resources and its three Agencies namely; Jigawa State Water Board (JSWB), Small Towns Water Supply and Sanitation Agency (STOWA) and Rural Water Supply and Sanitation Agency (RUWASA).

At the inception of this Administration there was acute shortage of water supply across the State of which only about 40% of all the schemes were fully functional, This is due to frequent breakdown of water facilities and the capital intensive nature of water resources management.

It is in view of this the State Government awarded contracts worth **N732,923,871.22** for the rehabilitation of all dysfunctional water supply schemes (hand pumps, motorized and solar schemes) across the State as highlighted in the breakdown below:-

1 Rehabilitation of **108** number Motorized water supply schemes under Jigawa State Water Board at the cost of **N389,879,731.63**;

- 2 Rehabilitation of **240** number Solar and Motorized water supply schemes under STOWA at the cost of **N250,222,357.26**;
- 3 Rehabilitation of **4,571** number hand pump operated Boreholes under RUWASA at the cost of **N92,821,782.33**;

The State Government Carried out additional rehabilitation of dysfunctional water supply schemes across the State by direct labour at the total cost of **N259,889,392.79** as per breakdown below:-

- 1 Rehabilitation of seven number Motorized water supply schemes under Jigawa State water Board at the cost of N32,873,630.00;
- 2 Rehabilitation of Solar and Motorized water supply schemes under STOWA across the State at the cost of **N256,602,029.79.**







CONVERSION OF MOTORIZED PUMPS TO SOLAR POWERED PUMPS AT NEW MARKET DUTSE



INVESTMENT PROMOTION

top priority of the Muhammad Badaru administration is the promotion of commerce & industry as a key driver in growing the State's Economy. The Government is committed to providing the necessary enabling environment for continuous improvement in the Business Environment and Investment Climate in order to expand the role of private enterprise. InvestJigawa, A full-fledged agency, was set-up for the sole purpose of mobilizing private sector investments into Jigawa State and acting as a one-stop shop for the potential investors. The agency was formalized by this administration on the 20th of June 2016.

Through a re-invigorated InvestJigawa, investment promotion activities are now being effectively and efficiently coordinated across the Ministries, Departments and Agencies of Government.

The Agency is presently handling approximately **30 "green field"** investment projects expected to generate an investment portfolio of over **US\$1billion** generating over **50,000 jobs**. While a number of Investments were actualized courtesy of His Excellency's business acumen and personal knack for investment mobilization, others have remained in the pipeline.

Among those actualized are: Vinylon footwear limited, Granite tiles manufacturing by GCC Vanguard in Dutse, Majestic Farms, ; Danmodi Foods in Kafin Hausa, and Klysat rice mills, Hadejia Jigawa Rice mills, Gujungu, Three-Brothers Rice Mill in Hadejia as well as WACOT- a sesame cleaning plant, Fine Baby Limited (a modern Garment Factory at in Maigatari) and Jifatu Food processing, Dutse

Mallam Allu Farms, B/kudu and 2 fertilizer blending plants at Gujungu and B/kudu. Also a number of renewable energy investment projects have been processed with land titled and acquired. These include Nova Scotia Power Development Company establishing an 80MW solar power plant in Dutse, Oriental Renewable Energy to develop a 50MW Independent Solar Park, Pan African Solar investing in a 130MW Solar Park in Dutse and Hadejia.

The process of establishing a Federal Government driven 1,000 MW Solar park in Gwiwa Local Government is also in progress with land identified and process of providing title underway.

In its efforts to improve the business climate in the State, a number of policies are being instituted to enhance ease of doing business in the State. It should be noted that Jigawa is the first State in the Country to fully adopt the principles of Responsible Agriculture Investment (RAI). The implementation of RAI has led to the development of the Land Acquisition and Resettlement Framework (LARF). The LARF framework provides guidelines for the acquisition of Land for Large Scale Agriculture, and ensures that rights of all land users are adequately protected and improves investor confidence in the process.

Land Administration

At the inception of this administration, less than 1% of the landed property in the State was titled. Recognising the socio-economic impact of land titling, Government in collaboration with GEMS3 – a DFID program, quickly embarked on improving the Systematic Land Titling Registration by deploying GIS technology to capture land titles and properly document data of land owners using a secured, efficient and effective database platform. The exercise, which is empowering land owners with a timely access to land titles and certificates is also adding value to land ownership in the State, making it easy for land owners to access credit for their businesses and also helping Government with accurate data for development planning.

So far, 24,680 parcels of land have been registered within the State. The success recorded in the exercise has prompted the acceleration of this program S into the zonal offices of Hadejia, Kazaure, Gumel, Ringim and Birnin Kudu slated for later part of this year.

To protect the rights of land owners and their host community, the Ministry of Land in collaboration with the Jigawa State Investment Promotion agency (InvestJigawa) and GEMS3 produced the Land Acquisition and Resettlement Framework, the first of its kind in Nigeria. The framework which is in compliance with the Responsible Agriculture Investment (RAI) principles has been adopted as a regulatory framework for the allocation of land for large scale agriculture in the State. The framework ensures that the livelihood of Project Affected Persons are sustained during the execution of the project while also protecting the community interests in the project and by extension ensuring that the people and the State derive full benefits from the projects.

In the period under review, the Ministry has allocated land for several projects after undergoing an open and transparent process as follows:

- 6 hectares of land granted to GCC at Kachi, Dutse District, Dutse L.G.A for the construction of tiles and marbles factory.
- 12,000 hectares of land granted to great Northern Agribusiness Ltd for the production of sugar cane plantation at Gagarawa and 1000 hectares for factory.
- 250ha granted to Dangote Rice Limited for the construction of a rice mill.
- 200 hectares of land granted to NOVA SCOTIA for 80MW solar power generation at Dutse.
- 200 hectares of land proposed to be pan African Solar for generating 125MW solar power project at Dutse and Hadejia.
- 100 hectares of land proposed to be granted to Oriental Renewable energy along Limawa War wade road for 50MW solar power project at Dutse.
- 36 hectares of land granted for Hadejia Specialist hospital including the access road surrounding the site at Hadejia town

• 110 hectares of land granted to the Federal University Dutse Cooperative Society Limited at Hammayayi Road Dutse for housing scheme and resettlement layout, e.t.c.


